Temperatures are starting to fall below freezing, which means it's time to winterize our replica canal boat, the *Delphi*. The boat is 54 feet long, and when fully loaded it weighs 23 tons! We are glad the lifts are hefty enough to keep the boat well above the freezing water, which could cause damage in case of solid ice.



Part of the work involves replenishing the batteries located underneath the main deck. While original canal boats would have used animal power, our boat uses a pair of electric motors. Legend has it that the *Delphi* was once pulled by horses on our canal, but it didn't go very smoothly!



With the tiller (steering mechanism) safely tied off and the ballast tanks emptied, we are ready to bid the *Delphi* a happy hibernation, and we will be looking forward to more nautical adventures in the
