

If you were applying to be a crew member on a canal boat during the Canal Era, what sorts of skills would you put on your resume? Perhaps your attention to detail, your punctuality, or your seafaring experience? According to Dora Mayhill's *Old Wabash and Erie Canal in Carroll County*, those skills wouldn't get you too far! Mayhill writes, "Captains chose their men for their fighting ability rather than for their skill in navigation."

How is "fighting ability" relevant? As the saying goes, "time is money," and a crew that can make good time is a valuable crew indeed. If two or more boats arrived at a lock in the canal at the same time (and locks take some time for each vessel to pass through!) it was *theoretically* up to the lockkeeper to decide who would pass first. But in reality, "the first boat through the lock was the boat whose crew could lick the other crew."

There was a system of rules and fines in place to prevent unscrupulous behavior, but this wasn't always a sufficient deterrent. One underhanded technique was for captains to literally shove their boat ahead of other boats into the lock. The aggressive captain would have his money in hand, hop off the boat to pay the fine, then continue along his merry way, shaving valuable time off their voyage!
