Red Bridge Renovation



For anyone who has enjoyed Delphi's trail system, the Red Bridge has been a centerpiece of the hiking experience. Thanks to a generous grant from the Community Foundation of Carroll County, the Red Bridge will be getting a full makeover this year! The grant will cover the cost of materials for new decking and new paint on the wrought iron marvel.

There was strong interest in renovating the bridge this year, but unfortunately the funds were lacking to tackle the job in 2023. That is when the Community Foundation stepped up and offered its vital support to allow this work to take place this year!

What is your volunteer role at the Canal?

I maintain the canal by cleaning up, mowing, and picking up trash at the Carrollton Bridge. I also help out with different projects that come up at Canal Park. I've been doing this kind of stuff for so long, I'm a jack of all trades.



How many years have you been volunteering, and how did you get involved?

We just started cleaning up at the Carrollton Bridge last year. I just live a couple miles from there, and I'd go down and it was a mess. I wanted a place to put a boat in, and I wanted to make it look better for everyone.

What is your favorite part of volunteering at the Canal?



Above, you can see a photo from the bridge's previous repainting, approximately ten years ago. The current decking dates back to the late 1990's. While it has lasted a long time, the wood has been showing its age and is ready for replacement!

The Red Bridge was originally a span over Paint Creek near Camden, Indiana. According to Mark Smith, Carroll County Historian, "the official architectural nomenclature for the Red Bridge is that of 'bow-string," and the bridge dates all the way back to 1874, the year that the Wabash & Erie Canal shut down.



During initial work by volunteers from Carroll County Wabash & Erie Canal, you might be amazed to know that only <u>four</u> original bolts were broken in the restoration process from the approximately <u>one thousand</u> bolts of the bridge. That is some impressive durability for a bridge over 100 years old!

Why is the bridge painted red? Mark Smith notes that one of the original restoration volunteers, Ron Dust, had an "expertise in paint knowledge that led to the discovery of the original shade of red used in 1900 (the last year the bridge was painted)."

I enjoy the appreciation from the people and visitors. When you go down and see a family that's never been fishing, and they are having a good time, I'm glad to help and be part of it. I get to give them pointers about what bait to use. There are always people using kayaks and enjoying the river, too. A big attraction is having somewhere to learn history and enjoy the outdoors.



Do you have a favorite Canal Era fun fact?

When the Canal went through Logansport, they had to build an aqueduct to conduct the water [the Eel River Aqueduct was 200 feet long, a wooden trunk built upon stone abutments]. The Canal was above the river's level, so the water had to be fed from far away. [For instance, the Eel River Aqueduct was fed by the dam all the way at Peru!]

What male bird is classic orange and black and recently migrated to our area? Clue two: its song is a clear, slurred whistle "hey! hey you! See me here sing-ing!" or a scolding chatter "chrt-trr-rrrrr!" Clue three: they prefer open woodland settings with tall trees for nesting, such as city parks and farmland grooves. It has a baglike nest often built near the end of a horizontal branch overhanging a road or water. Clue four (fun fact): It was named for the royal colors of Lord Baltimore. Another Fun Fact: They will visit feeders for fruit, such as an orange half or orange half filled with grape jelly. Yes, it is the Baltimore Oriole.



Do you know what the Indiana State bird is? Clue one: Its song is "purty-purty-purty, what-cheer! What-cheer! Tee-tee-tee-tee-tee!" or "pik!" Clue two: It's red with a crest on its head. Yes, it's a Northern Cardinal. By the way, the female and juvenile are crested and reddish brown in color.

Do you know what the Indiana State tree is: Clue one: It's a tall, straight handsome tree with branches often angling upward. Clue two: Its peculiar leaves are 4-pointed and are notched at the tip. Clue three: It

You all know what the national bird is - the bald eagle. But do you know what Benjamin Franklin wanted the National bird to be? Clue one: it can't fly very far, but can fly surprisingly fast reaching speeds of 55-60 mph. Clue two: It prefers mixed woods with some open area. Clue three: Males give a distinctive gobble and females call their young with a sharp "tuk!tuk!" Benjamin Franklin lost getting to name the turkey to be the National bird.

Look for the Baltimore Oriole especially, but also for the cardinal and the tulip tree and maybe even find a wild turkey on the Nature Hikes led by David McCain this summer! He will lead you along the towpath looking for all the variety of trees and birds that live in this area. Join him at 2:30 on June 10, July 1, Oct 21, Nov 4 and Dec 26. You'll see the trees in different seasons and different birds will be migrating through something different each time. Enjoy the Wabash & Erie Canal as you've never seen it before!
