Volunteer Highlight: Dean "Dino" Smoll

Canal Days and a Super Summer



A few weeks ago, we celebrated in style with the Canal Days Festival, and we pulled out all the stops! If you weren't able to join us (or if you want to relive the memories), here's a quick recap of how we got to share and enjoy Indiana history with guests from all over!

What do you do at the Canal? I drive the boat and help maintain it. I tried narrating too, but I need to brush up and get better at that.

I'm a maintenance electrician, so the electronic control system on the boat is right in my wheelhouse, pun intended. I've helped with diagnosing motor troubles and swapping motors out to keep the boat running smoothly.

Where are you from, and how long have you been volunteering at the Canal? I grew up in Central Wisconsin, but home to me is this Northwest Indiana. I've been here a lot longer than anywhere else! I went to school in Chicago and flipped a coin to decide whether I would move back north or head south. This is my second year on the boat crew.



In the Pioneer Village, there were demonstrations galore where children and adults could get hands-on with different historic trades (and even take their treasures home!). Do you know why we celebrate Canal Days on July 4th weekend? The answer has to do with American canal history! The Erie Canal's construction began on July 4, 1817, and it was an astounding success. In subsequent years, almost every internal improvement project started on July 4 as a hopeful token of good luck. Historian Alvin Harlow noted, "The canal project which did not turn its first earth on the Fourth was considered to have made a bad start." Construction on the Wabash & Erie Canal began on George Washington's birthday (February 22), so maybe the July 4th tradition was worth observing!



How did you get involved at the Canal? It was all Mike's fault. I was skeptical at first because I didn't know what to expect. After getting a tour of the facility and seeing the boat, I was totally on board (pun intended).

Once you see what has been done here, how the organization has done an incredible job turning a swampy canal into a destination for people to learn history, it's hard not to want to join!

What is your favorite part of volunteering at the Canal?

It's fun being around the people, both guests and fellow volunteers. It's a great feeling to see people board the boat, excited for the ride. It's rewarding to see people smile when they get off the boat having had a great experience.


Save your date today!
